Teach Your Child About Secrets

Knowing a secret can be enticing for anyone. Even adults are sometimes thrilled at the thought of being trusted with information. Children are no

different. They love to be in on the birthday surprise for Dad or the surprise party for another beloved family member. However, they need to know that while some secrets lead to fun surprises, others can be dangerous or harmful.



Parents can help children develop awareness of unsafe secrets and what to do if they are ever asked to keep one.

The human desire to be included can be alluring and powerful and make temptation difficult to ignore. Because it is not uncommon for adults to keep secrets, your child may view this behavior as a sign of growing up or being trustworthy. Unfortunately, it is this kind of thinking that makes them so vulnerable to those who have bad intentions. Teach your child to be aware of the tactics people use to groom children for manipulation. Tell your child that most people are good, but some people are not to be trusted. Explain that people like this might ask a child to keep a secret. They might give a child a gift and say to keep it secret, or they might touch a child in a way that doesn't seem right and say not to tell anyone. Tell your child that if an adult or older child tells him or her to keep a secret from you, it is an unsafe secret and to tell you as soon as possible. Reassure your child that he or she will not be in trouble for telling the truth. Impress upon your child that when we tell the truth, our hearts are at peace.

Reflection

Questions

How may I demonstrate grace, integrity, and honesty for my child? In what ways do I show my child that I want what is best for my family in the eyes of God?

Lead Your Child to Grow with God: Spiritually, Socially, and Physically

Spiritual Parents want their children to feel free to tell them everything. At times, children may fear the consequences of doing so and opt to hide the truth. Remind children that God knows them and everything about them. When we live God's truth, we make room in our hearts for a deeper relationship with him.

Social Children at this age want adults to pay attention to them and listen to what they have to say. Their enthusiasm may cause them to interrupt. Politely encourage your child to wait his or her turn to speak. When it is your child's turn, look him or her in the eyes to show your full attention. Ask questions. Children need positive and meaningful experiences to progress socially.

Physical Tune in to how your child feels about physical touch. As children get older, they may not want the same cuddles, or

perhaps they want more!
Respect your child's wishes.
There are many ways to show affection, such as having one-on-one conversations, reading bedtime stories together, and participating in established family routines.

Big Ideas

Words to Know

safe secret ·

Something that is kept confidential for a short time, such as a surprise party or a gift

unsafe secret ·

Something that is kept hidden to conceal a serious misdeed or crime

Bringing the Lesson Home

Determine ahead of time when and where you and your child will engage with the lesson content. Read or complete Side A of the worksheet with your child.



STEP 1

ENGAGE & EXPLORE

SAY: I don't want a secret to make you feel sad, upset, or unhappy. If you know a secret that makes you feel this way, the secret is unsafe. Please tell me right away if someone asks you to keep a secret. Adults shouldn't ask children to keep secrets.



Ask your child to tell you the difference between a safe secret and an unsafe secret. Lead the conversation so that you can determine your child's ability to distinguish between safe and unsafe secrets. Then try to discern if your child knows what to do in case he or she is burdened with an unsafe secret.

SAY: My hope for you is that you are never troubled with an unsafe secret, but I want you to know that you can come to me if you have one. You will not be in trouble. You will be nearer to God. He wants us to live his truth every day.

Bringing the Lesson Home (continued)

STEP 2 REFLECT & RESPOND


Read or complete Side B of the worksheet with your child.

SAY: It's so important to know the difference between safe secrets and unsafe secrets. Unsafe secrets cause harm, so we need to recognize them when we hear them.

Look at Side B of the worksheet. Have your child read each

scenario and explain why the secret is safe or unsafe.

SAY: Let's pray together now to tell Jesus that we love him. We believe he will help us know when to keep secrets and when to tell them. Pray aloud the Act of Faith, Hope, and Love. Begin and end the prayer by praying the Sign of the Cross.





Act of Faith, Hope, and Love (adapted)

Jesus, I believe in you. Jesus, I hope in you. Jesus, I love you.
